
Kern Press Club Awards Winners

Call for Nominations

The Committee on Academic Requirements and Standards (CARS) has recommended to the Senate Executive Committee that the Committee on Gender, Race & Ethnicity (GRE) become an elected committee. The School of Humanities and Social Sciences: must elect four (4) members:

• Two (2) faculty members representing disciplines in the Humanities (Art, Communications, English, History, Liberal Studies, Modern Languages & Literature, Music, Philosophy & Religious Studies, Theatre) to serve a one-year term from June 2007 through June 2008.
